God's Love for Man

Memory Verse – Genesis 1:27 (NKJV).

"So God created man in His *own* image; in the image of God He created him; male and female He created them."

1. How did God show His love for all people?

John 3:16 (NKJV). "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life."

2. How did God bestow His love upon us?

1 John 3:1 (NKJV). "Behold what manner of love the Father has bestowed on us, that we should be called the <u>children of God! . . ."</u>

3. How is God described?

1 John 4:7, 8 (NKJV). "7 Beloved, let us love one another, for love is of God; and everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. 8 He who does not love does not know God, for God is love."

4. How has God described Himself?

Exodus 34:6, 7 (NKJV). "6 And the LORD passed before him and proclaimed, 'The LORD, The LORD God, merciful and gracious, longsuffering, and abounding in goodness and truth, 7 keeping mercy for thousands, forgiving iniquity and transgression and sin, . . ."

5. How was God's love manifested?

1 John 4:9 (NKJV). "In this the love of God was manifested toward us, that God has <u>sent</u> His only begotten Son into the <u>world</u>, that we might live through Him."

6. How is love described?

1 Corinthians 13:4-8 (NKJV). "4 Love <u>suffers long</u> and is <u>kind</u>; love does not <u>envy</u>; love does not <u>parade</u> itself, is not <u>puffed up</u>; ⁵ does not behave <u>rudely</u>, does not seek its <u>own</u>, is not <u>provoked</u>, thinks no <u>evil</u>; ⁶ does not rejoice in iniquity, but <u>rejoices</u> in the <u>truth</u>;

⁷ bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. ⁸ Love never fails. . . . "

7. What was our condition when God loved us?

Romans 5:8 (NKJV). "But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us."

8. How do we develop God's type of love?

1 John 2:5 (NKJV). "But whoever <u>keeps His word</u>, truly the love of God is perfected in him. By this we know that we are in Him."

9. How is God's love perfected in us?

1 John 4:12 (NKJV). "No one has seen God at any time. If we love one another, <u>God abides in us</u>, and His love has been perfected in us."

10. What cannot exist were perfect love is?

1 John 4:18 (NKJV). "There is no fear in love; but perfect love casts out fear, because fear involves torment. But he who fears has not been made perfect in love."

11. What type of love does God have?

Jeremiah 31:3 (NKJV). "The LORD has appeared of old to me, saying:

'Yes, I have loved you with an <u>everlasting love</u>; Therefore with lovingkindness I have drawn you."

12. Why do we love God?

1 John 4:19 (NKJV). "We love Him because <u>He</u> <u>first</u> loved <u>us</u>."

13. Who loves like Jesus?

John 15:9 (NKJV). "As the <u>Father</u> loved Me, I also have loved you; abide in My love."

14. What do we comprehend when Christ dwells in our hearts?

Ephesians 3:17-19 (NKJV). "¹⁷ that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith; that you, being rooted and grounded in love, ¹⁸ may be able to comprehend with all the saints what *is* the width and length and depth and height—

19 to know the <u>love of Christ</u> which <u>passes</u> <u>knowledge</u>; that you may be filled with all the fullness of God."

15. What cannot the true Christian be separated from?

Romans 8:38, 39 (NKJV). "³⁸ For I am persuaded that neither death nor life, nor angels nor principalities nor powers, nor things present nor things to come, ³⁹ nor height nor depth, nor any other created thing, shall be able to separate us from the <u>love of God</u>, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord."

1. What two things testify of God's love? (Paragraph 1).

"Nature and revelation alike testify of God's love."

2. Why did God allow trials and difficulties? (2).

"The thorn and the thistle—the difficulties and trials that make his life one of toil and care—were appointed for his good as a part of the training needful in God's plan for his uplifting from the ruin and degradation that sin has wrought."

3. What in nature reveals God's love? (1-3)

"The sunshine and the rain, that gladden and refresh the earth, the hills and seas and plains, all speak to us of the Creator's love."

"There are flowers upon the thistles, and the thorns are covered with roses."

"God is love' is written upon every opening bud, upon every spire of springing grass The lovely birds making the air vocal with their happy songs, the delicately tinted flowers in their perfection perfuming the air, the lofty trees of the forest with their rich foliage of living green—all testify to the tender, fatherly care of our God and to His desire to make His children happy."

4. What reveals the character of God? (4)

"The word of God reveals His character."

5. How do earthly relationships represent God's love? (5)

"Through the things of nature, and the deepest and tenderest earthly ties that human hearts can know, He has sought to reveal Himself to us. Yet these but imperfectly represent His love."

6. How has Satan sought to picture God? (5).

"Though all these evidences have been given, the enemy of good blinded the minds of men, so that they looked upon God with fear; they thought of Him as severe and unforgiving.

Satan led men to conceive of God as a being whose chief attribute is stern justice,—one who is a severe judge, a harsh, exacting creditor. He pictured the Creator as a being who is watching with jealous eye to discern the errors and mistakes of men, that He may visit judgments upon them."

7. Why did Jesus come to live among men? (5).

"It was to remove this dark shadow, by revealing to the world the infinite love of God, that Jesus came to live among men."

8. Who was Jesus to reveal? (6).

"The Son of God came from heaven to make manifest the Father."

9. What was the work of Christ? (7).

"This was His work. He went about doing good and healing all that were oppressed by Satan. There were whole villages where there was not a moan of sickness in any house, for He had passed through them and healed all their sick. His work gave evidence of His divine anointing."

10. What character traits were revealed in every act of His life? (7).

"Love, mercy, and compassion were revealed in every act of His life; ..."

11. What did God do to reach our wants? (7).

"He took man's nature, that He might reach man's wants."

12. List several methods Jesus used in dealing with people. (8).

"Jesus did not suppress one word of truth, but He uttered it always in love. He exercised the greatest tact and thoughtful, kind attention in His intercourse with the people. He was never rude, never needlessly spoke a severe word, never gave needless pain to a sensitive soul.

"He did not censure human weakness. He spoke the truth, but always in love. He denounced hypocrisy, unbelief, and iniquity; but tears were in His voice as He uttered His scathing rebukes."

13. Why did Jesus live, suffer and die? (10).

"It was to redeem us that Jesus lived and suffered and died."

14. What broke the heart of Jesus? (10).

"It was the burden of sin, the sense of its terrible enormity, of its separation of the soul from God—it was this that broke the heart of the Son of God."

15. Why did God give Jesus to redeem us? (11).

"Christ was the medium through which He could pour out His infinite love upon a fallen world."

16. Why could only Jesus accomplish our redemption? (13).

"None but the Son of God could accomplish our redemption; for only He who was in the bosom of the Father could declare Him. Only He who knew the height and depth of the love of God could make it manifest.

Nothing less than the infinite sacrifice made by Christ in behalf of fallen man could express the Father's love to lost humanity."

17. What is the duration of Jesus' ties with mankind? (14).

"He who was one with God has linked Himself with the children of men by ties that are never to be broken."

18. The sacrifice of Christ does what three things for mankind? (14).

"And all this that man might be uplifted from the ruin and degradation of sin that he might reflect the love of God and share the joy of holiness."

19. What special position may the redeemed occupy? (15).

"Through faith in the atoning sacrifice of Christ the sons of Adam may become the sons of God."

20. What thought has a subduing power on the soul and brings the mind into captivity to the will of God? (16).

"The matchless love of God for a world that did not love Him! The thought has a subduing power upon the soul and brings the mind into captivity to the will of God."

21. As we study the divine character in the light of the cross, what do we see? (16).

"The more we study the divine character in the light of the cross, the more we see mercy, tenderness, and forgiveness blended with equity and justice, and the more clearly we discern innumerable evidences of a love that is infinite

and a tender pity surpassing a mother's yearning sympathy for her wayward child."
