The Sinner's Need of Christ

What condition entered our world?

Romans 5:12 (NKJV). "Therefore, just as through one man <u>sin</u> entered the world, and <u>death</u> through sin, and thus death spread to all men, because all sinned—"

¹³ These things I have written to you who believe in the name of the Son of God, that you may know that you <u>have</u> eternal life, and that you may *continue to* believe in the name of the Son of God."

1. Describe mankind's original condition (Paragraph 1).

"Man was originally endowed with noble powers and a well-balanced mind. He was perfect in his being, and in harmony with God. His thoughts were pure, his aims holy."

2. Describe the results of Adam and Eve's disobedience (2)

"But through disobedience, his powers were perverted, and selfishness took the place of love. His nature became so weakened through transgression that it was impossible for him, in his own strength, to resist the power of evil."

3. What is the condition of the unrenewed heart? (2)

"It is not in harmony with God, and finds no joy in communion with Him."

4. Why would the sinner not be happy in God's presence? (2)

"The spirit of unselfish love that reigns there—every heart responding to the heart of Infinite Love—would touch no answering chord in his soul. His thoughts, his interests, his motives, would be alien to those that actuate the sinless dwellers there."

5. What is impossible by ourselves? (3)

"It is impossible for us, of ourselves, to escape from the pit of sin in which we are sunken."

6. What is the condition of our hearts? (3).

"Our hearts are evil, and we cannot change them."

7. Describe what education, culture, exercise of the will can and cannot do. (3).

"Education, culture, the exercise of the will, human effort, all have their proper sphere, but here they are powerless. They may produce an outward correctness of behavior, but they cannot change the heart; they cannot purify the springs of life."

8. When a person is born again, what does he or she receive? (4).

"The Saviour said, 'Except a man be born from above,' unless he shall receive a new heart, new desires, purposes, and motives, leading to a new life, 'he cannot see the kingdom of God."

9. What description exists regarding mankind's condition? (5).

"'I am carnal, sold under sin."

10. What thought most bothered Jacob after his sin in deceiving his brother Esau? (6).

"Lonely and outcast as he was, separated from all that had made life dear, the one thought that above all others pressed upon his soul, was the fear that his sin had cut him off from God, that he was forsaken of Heaven."

11. Who is the only link of communication with God? (6).

"The mystic ladder of his dream represented Jesus, the only medium of communication between God and man."

12. How does Christ restore communication with God. (7).

"Across the gulf that lay between, there could be no communion. But through Christ, earth is again linked with heaven. With His own merits, Christ has bridged the gulf which sin had made, so that the ministering angels can hold communion with man.

Christ connects fallen man in his weakness and helplessness with the Source of Infinite power."

Education, p. 29

"The result of the eating of the tree of knowledge of good and evil is manifest in every man's experience. There is in his nature a bent to evil, a force which, unaided, he cannot resist. To withstand this force, to attain that ideal which in his inmost soul he accepts as alone worthy, he can find help in but one power. That power is Christ.
