1. What did Joshua urge the people to do?

Joshua 24:15 (NKJV). "... choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve, . . ."

2. What did Elijah urge the people to do?

1 Kings 18:21 (NKJV). "And Elijah came to all the people, and said, 'How long will you <u>falter</u> between <u>two opinions</u>? if the LORD *is* God, <u>follow him</u>; but if Baal, follow him.' But the people answered him not a word."

3. What is God's part in our choices?

Philippians 2:13 (NKJV). "For it is <u>God</u> who works in you both to <u>will</u> and to <u>do</u> for *His* good pleasure."

4. What must we give up to follow Christ?

Luke 14:33 (NKJV). "So likewise, whoever of you does not forsake all that he has cannot be My disciple."

5. What did Jesus say about divided loyalties?

Matthew 12:30 (NKJV). "He who is not with Me is against Me; and he who does not gather with Me scatters abroad."

6. What person did Jesus say was not fit for the kingdom of God?

Luke 9:62 (NKJV). "But Jesus said to him, 'No one, having put his hand to the plow, and looking back, is fit for the kingdom of God."

7. What is God's promise if we seek Him?

"Jeremiah 29:13 (NKJV). "And you will seek Me and find Me, when you search for Me with all your heart."

8. What promise does God make to those who seek after righteousness?

"Matthew 5:6 (NKJV). "Blessed *are* those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, For they <u>shall</u> be <u>filled</u>."

9. How do those who are fully on God's side feel?

Romans 1:16 (NKJV). "For I am <u>not ashamed</u> of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God to salvation for everyone who believes, for the Jew first and also for the Greek."

10. How does God evaluate us?

1 Samuel 16:7 (NKJV). "... For the LORD does not see as man sees; for man looks at the <u>outward</u> appearance, but the LORD looks at the <u>heart</u>."

11. What should direct our actions?

Colossians 3:23, 24 (NKJV). "And whatever you do, do it heartily, as to the Lord and not to men, knowing that from the Lord you will receive the reward of the inheritance; for you serve the Lord Christ."

12. What new life do we live?

"Galatians 2:20 (NKJV). "I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me; and the *life* which I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me."

13. What is Christ's invitation?

Revelation 3:20 (NKJV). "Behold, I stand at the door, and knock. If anyone hears My voice and opens the door, I will come in to him and dine with him, and he with Me."

14. What choice regarding our eternal life do we have?

Matthew 16:24-26 (NKJV). "24 Then Jesus said to His disciples, 'If anyone desires to come after Me, let him <u>deny himself</u>, and take up his cross, and <u>follow Me</u>. ²⁵ For whoever desires to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for My sake will find it.

²⁶ For what profit is it to a man if he gains the whole world, and <u>loses his own soul?</u> Or what will a man give in exchange for his soul?"

15. How do we find or lose our life?

Matthew 10:39 (NKJV). "He who finds his life will lose it, and he who loses his life for My sake will find it."

16. What happened when the disciples were fully consecrated?

Acts 4:31 (NKJV). "And when they had prayed, the place where they were assembled together was shaken; and they were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and they <u>spoke</u> the <u>word</u> of God with <u>boldness</u>."

"The whole heart must be yielded to God or the change can never be wrought in us by which we are to be restored to His likeness."

2. What is the greatest battle that was ever fought? (5:3).

"The warfare against self is the greatest battle that was ever fought."

- 3. What must take place before we are renewed in holiness? (5:3).
 - "... the soul must submit to God before it can be renewed in holiness."

4. What choice will God not force us to make? (5:4).

"It remains for us to choose whether we will be set free from the bondage of sin, to share the glorious liberty of the sons of God."

5. In giving ourselves to God, what must be given up? (5:5).

"In giving ourselves to God, we must necessarily give up all that would separate us from Him."

6. List some things that can separate us from God. (5:5).

"Mammon is the idol of many. The love of money, the desire for wealth, is the golden chain that binds them to Satan. Reputation and worldly honor are worshiped by another class. The life of selfish ease and freedom from responsibility is the idol of others."

7. What is the value of performing the duties of the Christian life as that which God requires in order to gain heaven? (5:6).

Nothing.

8. What will be your motive or spring of action? (5:6). "Love to Christ will be the spring of action."

9. What question should you ask yourself when deciding to yield all to Christ? (5:7).

"What has Christ given for me?"

10. What does God not require us to give up? (5:10).

"God does not require us to give up anything that it is for our best interest to retain."

11. What does God require us to perform? (5:11).

"He requires us to perform only those duties that will lead our steps to heights of bliss to which the disobedient can never attain."

12. Describe how those who desire to give themselves to God really are? (5:12).

"You desire to give yourself to Him, but you are weak in moral power, in slavery to doubt, and controlled by the habits of your life of sin. Your promises and resolutions are like ropes of sand. You cannot control your thoughts, your impulses, your affections.

The knowledge of your broken promises and forfeited pledges weakens your confidence in your own sincerity, and causes you to feel that God cannot accept you; ..."

13. What is the will? (5:12).

"This is the governing power in the nature of man, the power of decision, or of choice."

14. How much depends upon the right action of the will? (5:12).

Everything depends on the right action of the will."

15. What should we do with our wills? (5:12).

"You can give Him your will; . . ."

- 16. When will God work in us to will and do of His good pleasure? (5:12).
 - ". . . He will then work in you to will and to do according to His good pleasure."

17. What happens to our nature when we give God our will? (5:12).

"Thus your whole nature will be brought under the control of the Spirit of Christ; your affections will be centered upon Him, your thoughts will be in harmony with Him."

18. Why will many be lost while hoping and desire to be Christians? (5:13).

"They do not come to the point of yeilding the will to God. They do not now *choose* to be Christians."

19. What will result through the right exercise of the will? (5:14).

"Through the right exercise of the will, an entire change may be made in your life."

20. How will a person be enabled to live a life of faith? (5:14).

"You will have strength from above to hold you steadfast, and thus through constant surrender to God you will be enabled to live the new life, even the life of faith."

Problem Solving

This young person has repeatedly failed to overcome a powerful addictive behavior, and has finally quit trying. He is backsliding, but still attends church. He has a desire for victory, but lack of hope that it can be achieved, at least for him. Each time he starts to change, the Devil brings so many other problems into his life that he gets overwhelmed and discouraged, and goes back to the addiction.

How can the Gospel help him to change not only his desire, but the actual sin itself?

The soul that is yielded to Christ becomes His own fortress, which He holds in a revolted world, and He intends that no authority shall be known in it but His own.

A soul thus kept in possession by the heavenly agencies is impregnable to the assaults of Satan. But unless we do yield ourselves to the control of Christ, we shall be dominated by the wicked one. We must inevitably be under the control of the one or the other of the two great powers that are contending for the supremacy of the world. It is not necessary for us deliberately to choose the service of the kingdom of darkness in order to come under its dominion.

We have only to neglect to ally ourselves with the kingdom of light. If we do not co-operate with the heavenly agencies, Satan will take possession of the heart, and will make it his abiding place. The only defense against evil is the indwelling of Christ in the heart through faith in His righteousness. Unless we become vitally connected with God, we can never resist the unhallowed effects of self-love, selfindulgence, and temptation to sin.

We may leave off many bad habits, for the time we may part company with Satan; but without a vital connection with God, through the surrender of ourselves to Him moment by moment, we shall be overcome. Without a personal acquaintance with Christ, and a continual communion, we are at the mercy of the enemy, and shall do his bidding in the end."
